
Challenges for the future

A number of challenges remain for screening and diagnostic testing for GDM. All of the diagnostic criteria for pregnancy in common use in the United States are based on the 100-g, 3-hour Oral Glucose Tolerance Test (OGTT). There are a number of reasons, however, that a 75-g test would be preferable. First, when a glucose tolerance test is administered to non pregnant individuals, it is standard to use the 75-g, 2-hour OGTT. Using a different glucose challenge in pregnant verses non pregnant patients leads to confusion in the laboratory and may result in errors in applying the proper diagnostic criteria. Further, the 75-g, 2-hour OGTT is in use during pregnancy in many countries around the world, typically using the same thresholds as in non pregnant individuals. Development and validation of pregnancy-based criteria using the 75-g, 2-hour OGTT would simplify world wide comparison of data and the testing paradigm used in the United States.

ABOUT HYDERABAD

Hyderabad, the capital of Andhra Pradesh State, is a picturesque sprawling city located 1700 km to the south of New Delhi, India's capital and nearly 800 km to the east of Mumbai, the business capital of India. It is situated at an elevation of about 536.6 meters above the sea level and enjoys pleasant climate almost throughout the year.

The city has many majestic historical monuments, mosques and marvelous minarets. The world famous monument Charminar – an imposing structure with 53 meters high minarets is an attraction of the city. On the western outskirts of the city, the historical Golconda Fort is located. The Salarjung museum, the world's largest one-man collection, displays around 35,000 antique and art objects.

The Nehru Zoological Park was set up in 1959, as a natural habitat of all types of birds and animal species, spread over 300 acres of undulating landscape. Its Lion Safari Park is the first of its kind in South Asia.

The Lord Venkateswara temple on the hilltop of Kalapahad is a structure of grandeur and magnificence in marble blending with different architecture designs. The city also has one of the world's largest monolith statues of Lord Buddha, the incarnation of peace.



Golconda Fort:



Golconda fort is a majestic monument, which lies on the western outskirts of Hyderabad city. It speaks of a great cultural heritage of 400 years and is regarded as a place worth visiting. The fort was famous for its diamond trade and the 'Kohinoor' diamond is said to have come from here. Golconda is built on a granite hill 120m high. The fort has 8 gates or Darwazas as they are called locally, the main gate being Fateh Darwaza. Sound and Music show in English on all days between 06.30 and 07.30pm. Entry fee Rs. 25

Hyderabad is most famous for its charming minarets - the Charminar. The city is often identified with the majestic Charminar, which stands at the center of the old city. Charminar is a beautiful structure with four intricately carved minarets. Enormous in its size, this imposing monument exudes a charm that is more than 400 years old. Many people know Charminar as a historical monument constructed by Mohammad Quli Qutub Shah in 1591. But there are many historical facts that are associated with this great monument. With the restoration work of the Charminar in full swing many interesting facts about it are coming to light

Birla Mandir:



A trip to Hyderabad remains incomplete without a visit to this enchanting Temple, Birla Mandir. This shimmering ethereal temple of Lord Venkateshwara, built in sculpted white marble, floats on the city skyline, on Kala Pahad. The tower over the main shrine of Venkateswara called the Jagadananda vimanam is built in the Orissan style while the towers over the shrines of the consorts are built in the South Indian style. This temple displays a mixture of architectural styles.

Sprawling across 300 lush green acres, the Nehru Zoological park is one of the biggest zoos in Asia with over 250 species. 2450 animals and birds are kept in natural environment. The Lion Safari Park, Natural History Museum and Children's Train are the added attractions. The popular ones among the different species are white peacocks, mynahs, chimpanzees and rhinoceros. The Nehru Zoological Park is a must for nature lovers.

Salarjung Museum:



The Salar Jung Museum is located on Musi river in Hyderabad. It is the third largest museum in India having one of the biggest one-man collections of antiques in the world. This museum was set up by Yusuf Ali Salar Jung, the prime minister of Nizam of Hyderabad. He collected objects that are now presented in the museum. This museum displays an impressive collection of European and Indian paintings.

Timings: 10.00 a.m. To 5.00 p.m.Closed on Friday

Snow World is the World's Biggest and India's 1st Snow Theme Park. Spread over 17,000 square feet area, on Lower Tank Bund Road, behind Indira Park, it is yet another landmark place in twin cities. The visitors can chill out at minus 5°C and go merry with SNOW and have a SNOW-FILLED fun holiday.

Hussain Sagar:



The Tank Bund, the dam to the Hussain Sagar and the link between the twin cities, was built by Hazrat Hussain Shah, and is and has always been a major tourist attraction. A 16m high, 350 tonne monolithic Buddha statue on the Rock of Gibraltar is a major attraction at the Hussain Sagar. Spend at least a moment there to bathe in the cool breeze. Thirty-three elegant statues of eminent historic personalities like Tyagayya, Vemana and Pingali Venkaiah greet you warmly.

You wouldn't feel bad about spending money here, though. The wares are a fashion statement of their own, and come pretty inexpensive.



Chowmahalla Palace:



Chowmahalla Palace was once the centre of Hyderabad, It was the seat of the Asaf Jahi dynasty where the Nizam entertained his official guests and royal visitors. The palace is unique for its style and elegance. Building began in the late 18th Century and over the decades a synthesis of many architectural styles and influences emerged. The palace originally covered 45 acres but only 14 acres remain. This complex today consists of two courtyards with elegant palaces, the grand Khilwat (the Durbar Hall), fountains and gardens.

Mecca Masjid:

Mecca Masjid is one of the oldest and the largest mosques in India. Muhammad Quli Qutb Shah, the 6th Sultan of Hyderabad began building it in 1617. The work continued during the reign of Abdullah Qutub Shah and Tana Shah and was completed in 1694 by the Mughal Emperor Aurangzeb. It took about 8000 masons and 77 years to be completed.
